 No lids, yogurt, butter, cottage cheese, salad, etc. containers
- Magazines
- Newspapers clean
- White copy paper - <u>NO colored paper,</u> junk mail, envelopes

 Metal cans - clean and rinsed (no food residue); no lids

The U.S. Census
- WHAT IS IT AND
WHY SHOULD I
PARTICIPATE?

Also known as the Population and Housing Census, the Decennial U.S. Census counts every resident in the United States. The census is mandated by Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution and takes place every 10 years.

Getting a complete and accurate count of the U.S. population is critically important. It helps communities determine where to build everything from schools to supermarkets, and from homes to hospitals. It helps the federal government decide how and where to distribute billions of dollars in federal funds across states and localities. It is also used to draw the lines of legislative districts and reapportion the seats each State holds in Congress.

The 2010 Census represented the most massive census participation ever witnessed in the Unites States. Approximately 74 percent of the households returned their census forms by mail; the remaining households were counted by census workers canvassing neighborhoods.

By April 1, 2020, every home in the U.S. will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 census. Help your state and community receive federal funds, grants, and support for schools, hospitals, roads, public works, and other vital programs. **Your participation is so important!**



Earthquakes, Tsunamis, Power Outages, Winter Weather ... Are You Ready?

A 7.7 magnitude earthquake approximately 78 miles northwest of Lucea, Jamaica, with an ocean depth of just 6.2 miles, shook parts of Jamaica and Cuba shortly after 2 p.m. on Tuesday, January 28th, triggering a tsunami warning for coastal areas in that area. A small tsunami wave was observed at George Town, Cayman Islands; tsunami danger was over by 4 p.m. Shaking was felt as far away as Miami, Florida, with high-rise buildings swaying from the event.

The threat of a catastrophic event here on the south coast is ever present. The threat has been widely publicized and discussed; earthquake and tsunami drills continue to be conducted on an annual basis. Still, many people are not prepared for a major event!

If a large earthquake hits the south coast, it could take weeks or months for outside resources to reach Coos County by ground depending upon the earthquake/tsunami damage. Bridges may be too compromised to accommodate traffic; roads may be buckled and blocked with trees and debris.

It is ESSENTIAL for the welfare of your family, and the community as a whole, that you are PREPARED.

Preparation and practice are key to surviving a catastrophic event.

- Are you ready to evacuate at a moment's notice, wherever you are, if we had an earthquake, a tsunami warning, or other catastrophic event?
- Are you prepared for an extended power outage?
- Do you and every family member have an up-to-date 'go kit'?
- Have you and your family practiced an evacuation drill and discussed what to do in an emergency situation?
- Does every family member know where to meet as a group?
- Have you established a local primary point of contact and an out of the area contact?
- Are you familiar with the tsunami evacuation routes where you live? Where you work? Or wherever you may be? (Evacuation maps are available for the Coos Bay -North Bend area.)

Prepare, practice, and memorize your evacuation and emergency plans with your family; it may mean the difference between life and death as every second will count when a disaster strikes.

If an earthquake were to happen here, a local tsunami could arrive in less than 30 minutes. Roads may be impassable; you may have to walk to higher ground.

Stop by CIHA and pick up some disaster preparation pamphlets and local tsunami maps. There is also a large volume of information available on the internet about emergency preparedness.



Major project updates will continue to appear in the Sea-Ha Runner, The K'wen newsletter, and the MyTribe web portal.



Products should be left in their original container. Label materials not in their original container only if you are sure of the contents.

Please do not mix products together. Dangerous reactions can occur when some materials are mixed.

Make sure containers are properly sealed so they won't leak or spill. If a container is leaking, secure it in a secondary leak-proof container.

Transport in a sturdy box or tub in your trunk or truck bed.

Please do not put items in plastic bags.

Bring in any of the items listed and we will dispose of them for you in a manner friendly to the environment.

Metal Collection Event

Coos County has extended the time period for the metal collection event at the Beaver Hill Disposal Site. The time period has been extended to September 30, 2020. The fee for metal will be waived for this time period.

Examples of accepted items:

- washers, dryers, stoves, water heaters, small metal appliances
- wood burning stoves
- empty burn barrels
- barbeques
- microwave ovens
- refrigerators/freezers Coos County will remove freon and compressors
- small and large metal tools
- metal furniture
- bicycles
- exercise equipment (metal)
- tire rims
- lawn equipment (drained)
- empty propane tanks with valve/stem removed
- metal fencing with wood posts removed
- nails, screws, misc. (please place in metal container or tin cans)
- miscellaneous scrap metal

Not accepted: vehicles, logging and fishing cable, Household Hazardous Waste

If you have any questions, please call 541-396-7620. Please leave a short message and a phone number as booth attendant may be outside the booth with customers.

If you have household garbage, furniture, brush, tires, or construction debris that you are bringing to Beaver Hill, please remember those items will need to be separated. The fees for these items will not be waived during the metal collection event.
