Please do NOT put the following items in the dumpsters:

- Antifreeze 
- Appliances 
- Batteries 
- Cell phones 
- Concrete Blocks 
- Electronics 
- Glass 
- Mattresses 
- Motor oil 
- Paint and Solvents
- Tires 
- Questionable Items

If you are unsure if an item can be placed in the dumpster, please call the CIHA office at 541-888-6501.

RECYCLE - Please recycle plastics, newspapers, magazines, tin cans, and other recyclable materials. A recycle bin is located next to the Tribal Police Department.

Oregon E-Cycle is a recycling program funded by electronics manufacturers and jointly implemented with the Oregon DEQ. Oregon E-Cycle locations accept TVs, computers, monitors and peripherals, printers, keyboards and mice for recycling for FREE at most Oregon E-Cycle sites.

Are you interested in planting and maintaining a raised garden bed in the Killich Community Garden this year? Spring is quickly approaching and gardening season will soon be here.



Generally, *cool weather crops* such as artichokes, broccoli, carrots, cabbage, chard, chives, kale, kohlrabi, lettuce, onions, peas, potatoes, spinach, squash, and turnips do well and yield plentiful harvests in our climate. This is only a partial list; experiment and have fun.

Garden beds will be assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis. As a gardener, you will need to plant, weed, fertilize, and harvest your bed as needed; *this requires a weekly personal commitment of time and energy.*

Monthly Housing Payment Pickup


Housing payment pickup is available for elders and people with disabilities. Call the CIHA office at 541-888-6501 during normal office hours to schedule a payment pickup.


New Indians, Old Wars

– Published in 2007, this book offers a series of essays addressing the themes taught in “Native American Studies” classes made available at many American colleges and universities. Rather than just a realistic history of the first Americans, the book suggests the justification used by the United States government to take the land from its original inhabitants can be seen as a parallel of modern day American foreign policy and the reactions generated from foreign countries impacted by these policies.



Inventing the Savage – A look at the criminal justice system and the disproportionate number of Native American women incarcerated in

Montana. The author shares her memories of growing up on the Flathead Indian Reservation and seeing many people arrested and incarcerated multiple times. To the author, the disproportionate rates appear to be directly tied to racial discrimination and long-standing colonial perspective of Euro-American dominance over indigenous peoples.



Prison Writings: My Life is My Sundance – Leonard Peltier’s memoir written from his Leavenworth federal prison cell.

Incredibly moving and poignant, Peltier describes in depth, the failures of the justice system that found him guilty of murdering two FBI agents during the American Indian Movement led protests at Wounded Knee in the early 1970s. Beyond his personal struggle for justice, Peltier writes about his entire life starting from his impoverished childhood and leading to the events that led him to be a leader with the AIM when the gun battle with FBI agents on the Pine Ridge Reservation occurred.



The Road: Indian Tribes and Political Liberty – A look at the legal status of tribes and the relationships these


sovereign nations have with both the federal government and the state where the sovereign nation resides. The authors examine the application of American ideals of self-government in federal relations with tribes. In their conclusions, they propose a constitutional amendment that would confirm the United States’



Constitution regarding the sovereignty of tribal governments.

American Indians, American Justice – Co-authored by Vine

Deloria, Jr. and Clifford M. Lytle, this book explores the complexities of the “present Indian situation” with regard to legal and political rights and also presents an overview of federal Indian law. Beginning with an examination of the historical relationship of Indians and the courts, the authors describe how tribal courts developed and operate today, and how they relate to federal and state governments. Key legal concepts such as “tribal sovereignty” and “Indian Country” are defined by the authors as they also identify the difficulties typically faced by Indians in the criminal and civil legal arenas. The book goes on to explore public policy and legal rights of American Indians in regards to citizenship, voting rights, religious freedom, and basic government services.
