Archaeology, Anthropology, and Native American History Books, Resources, and Information are Available at the CIT Library

The CIT Library contains an extensive amount of information on the Coquille Indian Tribe and other Tribes of southwest Oregon. The Library also has a public computer for the use of **Tribal** members and Kilkich residents.

Does archaeology, anthropology, or Native American history interest you? If so, stop by the CIT Library and check out some of Dr. Mark Tveskov's interesting works, as well as other historical resources and books by other authors.

If you haven't heard of Dr. Mark Tveskov, he is an archaeologist and professor of anthropology who has worked with the Coquille Tribe on archaeology projects for many years. His works include insight about historic sites in the southwest region where pioneers and military personnel first interacted with the area's first inhabitants, the ancestors of today's Coos and Coquille tribes. Dr. Mark Tveskov has provided detailed accounts of specific incidents that occurred in the 19th century based on excavations conducted at known sites. including the wreck of the Captain Lincoln and battles that took place during the Rogue River Wars and at the former Table Rock Reservation.

In his thesis, *The Coos and Coquille: A Northwest Coast Historical Anthropology*, Dr. Mark Tveskov takes a detailed look at both tribes and

explains how they lived before contact with pioneers and the interactions that occurred with colonialists in the mid-19th century. The library has multiple copies of this book.

You may access additional historical information at Southern Oregon University's Library collection of digital materials. These materials are available to view and download free of charge, at the Southern Oregon Digital Archives (SODA) http://soda.sou.edu.

Written by Terence O'Donnell, An Arrow in the Earth, is a biography of General Joel Palmer, an Oregon superintendent of Indian Affairs who negotiated treaties with multiple tribes in the mid-19th century. At a time when many who had settled in the southwest thought extermination of the Indians was the best solution, Palmer's negotiations likely saved the lives of many First People. Palmer negotiated treaties throughout Oregon, including one that created the Table Rock Reservation that is close to Medford, Oregon. Palmer was also the U.S. Representative for the two treaties that permanently impacted the Lower and Upper Coquille villages who are the ancestors of today's Coquille Indian

A collection of essays, edited by Stephen Dow Beckham, Oregon Indians: Voices From Two Centuries, account for almost 200 years of history between Oregon tribes and settlers and includes an essay on the Rogue River wars. Other essays include, Imprisonment at Alcatraz: Chief John of the Rogue Rivers; and The Takelmans' Trail of Tears. These are just two of many detailed historical accounts included in this collection.

Practice Safe Habits While Walking and Texting

While the following tips may seem like common sense, findings from a study conducted by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission show that in 2011, a total of 1,152 people of all ages were treated in hospital emergency rooms in the U.S. for injuries sustained while walking and using a cell phone or other electronic device. And according to statistics posted on

www.safekids.org, 61 children are hit by cars every day in the United States.

As children prepare for the new school year, they need to learn and practice basic safety tips

while walking to and from school and other activities, and around school buses and other traffic.

- Do not walk, talk, and text
- ◆ If you have to talk or text, move out of the way of others, move to the side of the walkway, or find a place to sit and text

- Do not cross or walk in the street while using an electronic device
- ◆ Do not walk with headphones in your ears
- Be constantly aware of your current surroundings

SCAM ALERT - Protect Your Personal Infor-

Crooks use clever schemes to defraud millions of people every year out of their personal information and money. New technology, age-old tricks, smooth-talking deceivers, and persuasive pressure are used in these convincing, and

people encourage victims to make key and important decisions on the spot. And in today's digital world, technology has provided an even larger platform for the criminals to work from. Awareness and diligence is paramount in protecting yourself from identity theft and scams. It is critical that you ALWAYS verify the person/company requesting personal information or money and NEVER give out ANY personal information or money until you have thoroughly verified the requesting party. Personal information includes, bank account numbers, debit and credit card numbers, your PIN, Social Security numbers, etc. Legitimate institutions will not request personal information over the telephone or the internet. Do NOT wire money, and do NOT trust caller ID. Scammers can spoof their numbers to look like they are calling from a legitimate location, even using your own telephone number to call you! The FTC has a list of current scams, https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/scam-alerts and a very helpful and informative website with detailed information.
