CIT Library - New Online Resources and Other Tidbits

The CIT Library recently began subscribing to an online service which maintains several archive collections covering numerous subjects related to tribes and native peoples.

Indigenous Peoples:

North America provides a diverse and informative source that can enhance research and increase users understanding of many historical experiences, traditions, innovations, and the governments of indigenous people from the United States and Canada. Multiple collections and subjects are covered through the use of manuscripts, monographs, newspapers, photographs, motion pictures, images of artwork, and more.

There are over 50 separate collections archived here, including a register of Chemawa students from traditions of tribes and 1880 to 1928; documents related to unratified treaties from 1801-1869; and an archive titled Indigenous People *Newspapers* containing over 20 newspapers published by tribes and associated groups from the last 100 years. These

and all of the other archives in the collection are primary sources of information that take users beyond facts and figures to an in-depth understanding of the perspective of indigenous people.

While this source is paid and you need to go to the CIT Library to utilize it, there are many other online resources out there for researching a wide range of topics connected to tribes and native peoples.

Don't forget that the Library



has a patron computer for your use.

Below are brief descriptions of two other web sites with online exhibits, archives, or similar collections related to the history and native peoples.

The National Museum of the American Indian (nmai.si.edu/) has multiple digitized versions of their exhibits available online. Of course, they are free, just like the Smithsonian counterpart in Washington, D.C. The

exhibits include *Treaties* Between the United States and American Indian Nations, which showcases some of the original treaty documents as means to tell the stories of the long-term relationships between the U.S. and various tribes: and The Great Inka Road: Engineering an Empire, which explores the foundations of the Inka Road in earlier Andean cultures, technologies that made building the road possible, the cosmology and political organization of the Inka world, and the legacy of the Inka Empire during the colonial period and in the present day. The Inka Road is a 20,000 + mile highway system that, during the Inka Empire, connected the capitol city of Cuzco, Peru with the far reaches of the Empire in neighboring countries of Argentina, Ecuador, Chile, Colombia, and Bolivia.

the Library of Congress and the National Archives have multiple online exhibits showcasing a unique perspective of the heritage of native peoples. Many of these exhibits, along with a few others of interest, are available through their web page. The online exhibits connected with this site include *Travels* in America, a collection of journal entries from over 250 people who traveled the United States between 1750 and 1920 and *Rivers*, *Edens*, and **Empires: Lewis & Clark** and the Revealing of America, which chronicles the Corps of Discovery's exploration of the American West, and their attempt to find a wateronly passage to the west coast, while connecting their expedition to other "new world" explorations in the 18th and early 19th centuries. These are two of over twenty online museum exhibits featured on the Native American Heritage Month web page.


