Turn Clocks BACK One Hour - Daylight Saving Time Ends Sunday, November 6 at 2:00 a.m.

Daylight saving time (DST) will end on Sunday, November 6 at 2:00 a.m.



Daylight saving time will begin in 2017 on Sunday, March 12 at 2:00 a.m.

DST began in the United States in 1918. It proved unpopular and was discontinued in 1919. Some cities and states, however, opted to continue DST

after 1919, but nationally, DST was not observed again until WWII when it was referred to as "War Time" and observed between 1942 and 1945.

Throughout the years following 1945, DST was practiced differently throughout the country and has been amended time and again for different economic reasons.

Since 2007, DST has begun every year on the second Sunday in March and ends on the first Sunday in November. Some states and territories in the U.S. still do not observe DST.

- Proof of address IF different from photo ID
- Proof of ALL persons residing permanently

in the household

- Income verification for entire household (if you receive SNAP, a printout from a DHS office works great for verification)

Office hours are 9:30 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday and 9:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. on Fridays.

Celebrating Native American Heritage Month in November

November is Native American Heritage Month. In recognition, we are looking at a few web sites showcasing events and activities native peoples and tribes are doing today. The United States has officially recognized Native American contributions to its heritage for over a century. A history of Native American Heritage Month is online at www.bia.gov/DocumentLibrary/HeritageMonth/.

In some places, Columbus Day has been renamed Indigenous Peoples Day. The origins of Indigenous Peoples Day date back to 1989 when the South Dakota legislature passed legislation changing the second Monday in October from Columbus Day to Native American Day, celebrating the day for the first time in 1990. Two years later, in 1992, Berkeley, California, replaced Columbus Day by celebrating Indigenous Peoples Day.

This year, several communities in Oregon held Indigenous Peoples Day celebrations on October 10, the same day as the federal Columbus Day holiday. The University of Oregon held several events that week-end in recognition of Indigenous Peoples Day. This included the re-commissioning of the Oregon Tribe flags at the UO's Museum of Natural and Cultural History. This was done while the museum completes a new wing that will be dedicated to sharing information on Oregon's tribes. A "grand re-opening" of the new museum wing will be held the first week of November featuring several new exhibits on Oregon's first peoples along with videos documenting living members of Oregon tribes working on preserving their tribes' culture and history.

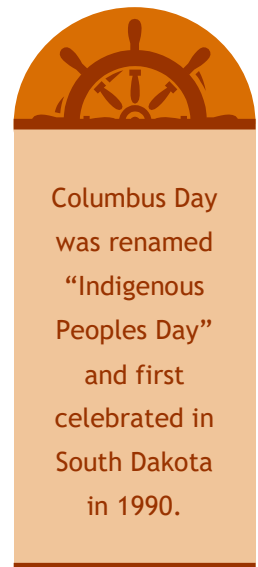
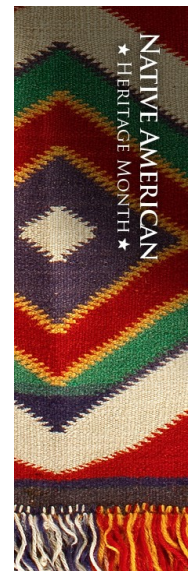
Another way to learn more about what Indian Tribes are doing today is by visiting web sites offering
