The Coquille Indian Tribe announces the sponsorship of the Summer Food Program for eligible applicants at the Tribal Community Center. Breakfasts and lunches will be made available Monday through Thursday free to all children residing on the reservation 18 years of age and under. Meals will be served at the Tribal Community Center beginning on June 20, 2012; meal times will be 8:30 a.m. for breakfast and 11:30 a.m. for lunch.

Restoration of Other Oregon Tribes

June 28 is the Coquille Tribe's Restoration Day. The Library has information on the Coquille's and other Oregon Tribes' restoration efforts.

Throughout the last weekend of June, the Coquille Indian Tribe will celebrate the anniversary of the June 28, 1989 signing of the Coquille Restoration Act. This celebration will include an all-night fire on Friday, a salmon bake on Saturday, and a traditional foods lunch on Sunday. Saturday and Sunday will also have a variety of activities including arts and crafts, stick games, drumming and dancing, flint-knapping demonstrations, and fish hook carving (plus venders and information booths). It is my understanding that the Restoration Celebration is open to all Kilkich residents. Please drop on by and see what happens. Even if you don't participate, obsidian is sharp, you can still have a lot of fun watching and learning.

For obvious reasons, the restoration of the Coquille Indian Tribe is considered very important to Coquille members. Perhaps some Kilkich residents, who are not Coquille but from another Oregon Tribe, understand the significance of having the United States recognize your Tribe's government as sovereign. The Library has many books on other Oregon Tribes in Oregon, and some of these books focus on these Tribes' efforts towards being recognized.

<u>Seeking Recognition</u> by David Beck is about the work put in by the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians towards, well, seeking recognition following the passing of the 1954 Western Oregon Termination Act. The book starts by telling about the Tribes before the arrival of settlers, leads to the signing of the un-ratified Treaty of 1855, and covers several major events between that time and their 1984 recognition. These include the forced removals to Yachats and the Siletz Reservation, the return to southwest Oregon during the allotment period, lawsuits against the United States during the 1930's, termination and the 30-year fight for restoration following termination. The book includes interviews with several members of the Tribe who were involved with these efforts.

The People are Dancing Again by Charles Wilkinson has been mentioned before in the Library column. Similar to Seeking Recognition, 'People' is a detailed history of the Tribes that make up the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians and has an entire section dedicated to restoration and the progress they have made since their 1977 restoration. The book's title is reference to the Siletz Tribes' ongoing success with cultural-based programs that teach members about their traditions and history while providing members opportunities to practice and perfect them.

The Library currently has three copies of <u>Seeking Recognition</u> and five copies of <u>The People are Dancing</u> Again.

Art to be displayed in an exhibition at the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Library in Washington D.C. throughout August 2012



Recently, some of the After-School program youth had the opportunity to work on an art project with local artist Bittin Duggan. Artsonia, the world's largest kids' art museum, hosted the "All Kids Can Create" call for art; children living in the United States were eligible to submit their artwork.

Bittin submitted the artwork the kids created to Artsonia. Two pieces of artwork from each state, nationwide, were selected from the submissions. One of the pieces of artwork selected from the state of Oregon was a masterpiece called "Music Pets" created by a Coquille Tribal member, 10 year old McKinzie Beaudry.
