Dumpsters Will Be Here Soon!

Dumpsters Arrive Friday, Aug. 24th Dumpsters Leave Tuesday, Sept. 4th



Community dumpsters will arrive on Tribal Lands on Friday, August 24th. The dumpsters are for the exclusive use of the Kilkich residents.

Items NOT allowed in the dumpsters include, but are not limited to, antifreeze, appliances, batteries, digital devices, electronics, glass, motor oil, paint, solvents, and tires. If you are unsure if an item can be discarded in the dumpster, please contact CIHA at 541-888-6501.

If you have items you no longer need or want, but don't want to throw them away, consider donating the items to a local thrift store or donation center. Thrift stores and donation centers accept household goods and clothing in sellable condition. Your donation is taxdeductible, helps people purchase household items at a reduced cost, and helps reduce the amount of waste going to the landfill.

Please recycle all recyclable material per the recycling guidelines posted on the recycling bin.
Recycling helps conserve natural resources, reduces the need for landfill space, and helps to lessen pollution and greenhouse gas emissions. The Kilkich community recycling bin is located next to the Tribal Police Department at 2602 Mexeye Loop.

Bumble Bees, Honey Bees, Yellow Jackets, and Paper Wasps

There are more than 4,000 species of bees in North America and nearly 20,000 globally.

Bees are one of the world's primary pollinators and without them humans and many other creatures would starve to death. If plants and flowers that require pollination aren't pollinated, new plant seeds and fruit aren't produced - it's that simple.

Many bee species are facing extinction due to habitat loss, intensive farming and pesticide use, climate change, and disease. Every year more bees are added to the endangered species list.

Wasps and bees are close relatives. There are also many insects that 'look' like a bee or a wasp but are neither.

Bees tend to be hairy which aids them in gathering of pollen; wasps are devoid of all hair, skinny-waisted, and have long spindly legs. Bees are pollen eaters; wasps are meat eaters. Both visit flowers for nectar. Bees collect pollen for their young; wasps prey on insects to feed to their offspring. Here are a few of the bees we see in our coastal climate.

BUMBLE BEES - a docile bee, usually a distinctive color of black and yellow that lives in small colonies. Bumble bees buzz loudly and carry pollen moistened with nectar in specialized pollen baskets called corbicula. They are a close relative of the honey bee.

Bumble bees rarely sting, but will if threatened. Female worker bumble bees have a stinger and are capable of stinging multiple times. The male bumble bee has no stinger.

Bumble bees do not store food

(honey) to survive the winter and will die off at the end of summer. New queens will hibernate during the winter and start a new colony in the

spring.

HONEY BEES have black stripes with bands of amber to brown coloring and live in hives. There are three types of bees in the hive; a queen, worker bees, and drones. The queen runs the hive and lays eggs for the next generation. The workers are all female; they build and protect the hive. The drones are all male; their sole purpose is to mate with the queen. When the hive goes into hibernation for the winter, drones are kicked out and die.

Female honey bees have a stinger and will sting if they feel threatened. They die once they sting. Drones do not have a stinger.

Honey bees collect nectar and convert it to honey. The majority of the bee larvae in the hive eat honey, but larvae that are chosen to become future queens are fed with royal jelly. Royal jelly is a white secretion produced by young, female worker bees.

AMAZING FACT: Honey is the only food that includes all the substances necessary to sustain life.

YELLOW JACKETS are social wasps with black and yellow markings on the front of the head and yellow banding around the abdomen.

Yellow jackets are closely related to hornets.

Yellow jackets are common visitors to picnics and parks in the summer. They are attracted to meat, fruit, and sweet drinks. They live in large colonies/nests that are typically built in the ground or around houses. Female yellow jackets can deliver a painful sting and can sting repeatedly due to their smooth stinger. They become protective if their colony is disturbed and will attack if someone approaches within a few feet of their nest.

In the fall, fertilized females leave the nest to seek a hibernation location; males and worker wasps die.

PAPER WASPS have red, yellow, or brown colored patterns on their back and have long legs and slender bodies. They build their water resistant nests of gray or brown papery material under roofs or eaves of a building from dead wood and saliva.

Unlike yellow jackets and hornets which can be very aggressive, paper wasps will generally only attack if they or their nest is threatened.

Paper wasps are 'social wasps' and are the most common type of wasp. In the fall, the females will search out an overwintering site; the rest of the colony dies.
