A place to gather

Workers are putting final touches on the Ko-Kwel Wellness Center's Community Gathering Room.

Barn-style doors were installed this week where the room connects with the rest of the building. With the doors locked shut, the room can be available for after -hours events.

Space for community events was a key priority in conversations about the wellness center two years ago. The room also will feature beams clad in cedar planks that were milled from the tribe's own trees.

Other milestones:

- The concrete slab will be poured Thursday for the porte cochiere (the covered drive-up).
- The last of the dental equipment will be installed this week.
- Glass for the round entryway is due next week.
- April 28 is the target date for the center's final inspection.

Winding down

Details on the inside, blacktop on the outside.

That's pretty much what's left for the last remaining weeks of the Ko-Kwel Wellness Center project. Here's what's happening now:

- Workers have been pouring concrete bases for the parking lot's light posts.
- Rebar is in place for the concrete pad outside the front door.
- Speaking of the front door, installation of the plankhouse-style round doorway is finished.
- Neighbors can expect persistent noise and vibration for a while. Rock is being spread and compacted in preparation for pouring asphalt.
- Members of the tribe's cultural staff have transplanted native tule to the property.
 Tule was a common textile material for Coquille ancestors, and it will be a featured element of the wellness center's landscaping.
- Inside, the main corridor is being prepared for flooring.
- Desks, chairs and office dividers are being assembled for the medical clinic.
- Cabinets and counters are being built in the reception area. They'll be faced with cedar planks from the tribe's own forest.
- Window blinds have been installed.

It won't be long now!

Counter culture

The Coquille people's heritage will infuse the reception areas of the Ko-Kwel Wellness Center.

Cedar planks, milled by tribal workers from logs harvested in the tribal forest, will greet visitors at the medical, dental, pharmacy and community services reception desks. Cedar accents will trim other parts of the wellness center as well.

Throughout the facility, crews of workers

are pushing for an early completion of the building — potentially as soon as next week.

Flooring is almost finished in the corridors, and furniture is being moved into the dental clinic.

Concrete is being poured this week for the *porte cochiere*, the covered drive-up at the main entrance. Next week, the parking area should start getting its asphalt.

Darned near done!


Just a few days remain before an inspector comes by to declare the Ko-Kwel Wellness Center "substantially complete."

That visit is expected early next week. If all goes well, the tribe will receive a temporary occupancy permit — leaving only minor details to tidy up.

Operations Director Fauna Larkin told the Tribal Council this week that all furniture should be in place by May 21, so the staff can move in May 24.

Meanwhile:

- Furniture for administrative and information technology offices will be in place by next week.
- But the tech guys won't be lounging in their new chairs. They're busy testing systems and wifi signal strength.
- More sidewalks are being framed and poured.
- Asphalt will arrive Monday for the parking lot.

Finishing touches

For now, watch for parking lot detour

The Ko-Kwel Wellness Center is just a few weeks away from welcoming patients. For now, though, patients need to navigate around the paving project in the parking lot.

To park at the existing Community Health Center, please use the newly opened north entrance.

Meanwhile, workers are applying a variety of finishing touches inside and outside the building:

- Painters and electricians are completing their work.
- Concrete pouring will continue next week.
- The tribe's Operations staff is installing furniture.
- The tribe's Information Technology team is setting up computers and phones.

It won't be long now!


Winding down

The list of unfinished tasks at the Ko-Kwel Wellness Center dwindles by the day.

- This week's most visible accomplishment is the parking lot, where asphalt was applied Tuesday night. But don't try to park there. It needs to cure for a week, and it needs to stay clean for striping.
- Elsewhere on the site, painters should be finished (or nearly so) by the end of the week.
- Electricians are wrapping up details for the tribe's technical team.
- The tribe's Operations Department is setting up furniture in the Community Services section of the building.

Still to come:

Watch for more curbs, gutters, sidewalks and asphalt in front of the old health center building. The old clinic will be repurposed.

Ready to MOVE

With a temporary occupancy permit in hand, the Coquille Tribe's new wellness center is all but finished. The tribe's Community Services staff (formerly Family Services) is set to move in Tuesday.

The new arrivals will provide company for the pharmacy team, whose quarters were completed in early March. Other departments will follow.

The tribe's Safety Committee walked through today, eyeballing evacuation routes and fire extinguishers.

Some final details remain before the center is pronounced complete, including:

- Curbing around the old health center
- Awnings and rain gutters
- Parking lot stripes
- Soap and towel dispensers
- And possibly a new paint color to replace the unpopular mustard on the exterior trim
